"Bradbury, the Prophet" Fahrenheit 451

- 1. He died in 2012 at the age of ninety-one.
- 2. He claimed it was a fugitive **chase** disguised as literature.
- 3. He wrote it in nine **days** on a typewriter that he rented.
- 4. He was born in middle America, Waukegan, Illinois.
- 5. First of all, it was a **boom** town for Hollywood previous to World War 2.
- 6. Everything airplane related seems to have grown up in Los Angeles during this time period.
- 7. One out of forty **Americans** was living in Los Angeles county.
- 8. So, he grows up in a LA that lived in a constant never-ending state of **newness** and rapid cultural shift.
- 9. That leads to a lot of **detachment** and a lot of not knowing your neighbors and not having a sense of neighborhood and belonging.
- 10. In 1945 the statistics tell us that fewer than ten thousand people had **televisions**, but by 1950 that number had jumped to six million.
- 11. For example, he saw **information** go from long scripts to sound bites the way we think of Twitter or new casts or commercials.
- 12. Everyone lives in this fear of technological **doom**.
- 13. He seems to take parts of the elements of that McCarthyism but uses it to underscore the whole idea of **isolation** and disconnection.
- 14. He talks about this idea of getting rid of **literacy** altogether.
- 15. In the name of not being hateful you begin to **suppress**, slowly but surely things that people are allowed to say.
- 16. He wanted the setting to be immediately **personable**, intimate; he wanted it to be an atmosphere that was strange but not extravagant.
- 17. The conformity is not being enforced by the government.

- 18. We have these outside threats of communism, so this idea of **sameness** became very important to Americans.
- 19. America, at the end of the day, especially if you're going to compare us to Japan, or India or Europe, we're a **baby** as a country.
- 20. One of the features of homes in this book are going to be the panels.
- 21. I laugh every time I see the word "ear thimbles".
- 22. Sentence one is a short sentence: It was a pleasure to burn.
- 23. Clearly, the tone at the very beginning is **excited**; he's happy.
- 24. Because, they are trying to beautify the world by erasing our history.
- 25. He's comparing the burning of books to **marshmallows**; you couldn't take them less seriously.
- 26. This ultimately is going to be a girl; her face is **slender** with milk white in it, a kind of gentle hunger.
- 27. White as it relates to this little girl is going to be reflective of her **innocence**; it's also used in an archetypal way.
- 28. And Montag, I want to point out, is going to be a kind of "everyman"; we're not meant to judge him, we're meant to BE him.
- 29. The **firetrucks** are called salamanders because they spit kerosene.
- 30. The phoenix is a bird that burns and rises out of the **ashes**.
- 31. He's immediately confronted with this person who is very engaged in their own being, they are very engaged in their own **awareness**, and they are very engaged in the world and experience.
- 32. She glows, almost like she's not even a real person: She has this **angelic** quality that is unlike anybody else in that world.
- 33. An entire **culture** is being "gaslighted"s at this point.
- 34. He's twice her age almost; he's been an adult for a long time.
- 35. So, Clarisse looks at Montag and she says, "Are you happy?"
